Study Group workshops

Apart from the general programme with its theme "chronic, resistant, recurring", there will also be workshops, short communications, tribunes, symposia and a programme for veterinary assistants. The Study Group workshops play a major role with their 24 modules.

This is a new concept whose organization has been handed over to the Study Groups. The format is based around small interactive workshops. Each workshop will last for 90 minutes with two discussion leaders for a maximum of 40 participants. Their content can echo the general congress theme or branch out in other directions.

Each study group will express itself through its chosen subject, whether it be technical advice, clinical cases, news, discussion forums... You will be welcome to join in.

■ **GEN workshop** : Discussion forum on epilepsy, K. Gnirs and L. Cauzinille.

For 90 minutes we will discuss ideas about the use of anti epileptic drugs, when to start such a treatment, whether complementary tests are necessary, communication between practitioners and their clients which is essential for mutual confidence, how to manage side effects. We will use concrete examples to promote a constructive dialogue.

■ **GEO workshop** : Cancer relapse, C. Muller and D. Lanore.

Using clinical cases we will discuss how to manage relapses of cancer with different options, changes in protocol, changes in treatment, diagnostic review, new check-up procedures.

■ **GEMI workshop** : chronic canine liver complaints, V. Freiche and P. Lecoindre.

Until recently, canine liver illness was not widely studied and diagnosis was not carried out soon enough. Our knowledge of canine hepatology has greatly progressed and this workshop will show the treatment of suspected chronic canine hepatology in the form of clinical cases.

■ **GEMI workshop** : leukopenia, thrombocytopenia, pancytopenia, S. Beurlet-Lafarge and A. Briend-Marchal.

Interactive clinical cases will raise different situations where the veterinarian is confronted with these problems. How to interpret this haematologic result and how to explore the illnesses which are the causes.

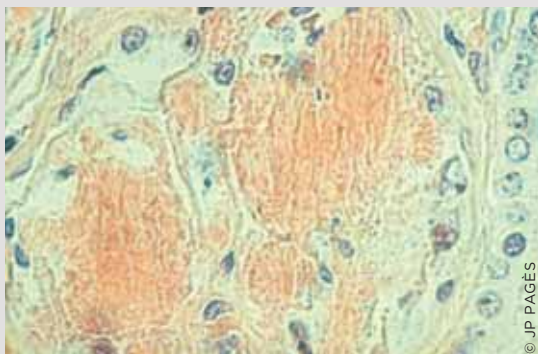

GEMI workshop

PROTEINURIA

■ Proteinuria is considered to be a risk factor in nephrology as well as in other illnesses. After a brief physiological summary we will evaluate the different methods used to discover the presence of proteinuria and ways of finding its origin. We will pay particular attention to renal proteinuria, using complementary examinations available to practitioners to try to determine the cause and the scale (renal biopsies will be discussed - see photo). Clinical cases for both dogs and cats will show the procedure to follow in terms of diagnosis and treatment.

If you have questions to ask about rhythm, Anna Gelzer, Professor Cardiology at Cornell University will be able to help you. Of Swiss origin, Anna has agreed to answer all your questions during this workshop, and she is able to speak equally well in French, German and English! ■ **GENAC workshop** : *Dental problems of rodents and rabbits, C. Bulliot and E. Tessier.*

Dental problems are often encountered during consultations with domestic rodents and rabbits and present a challenge to the veterinarian. They call for precise diagnostic and treatment procedures. This workshop will explore this subject in depth by means of a series of interactive clinical cases.
